We provide asylum support advice and training to frontline organisations, advice agencies and legal practitioners working with asylum seekers. We provide a range of training options and operate an Advice Line for frontline advisors.
 We also co-ordinate the Asylum Support Advice Network a network of over 600 advisors who are working with asylum seekers nationwide who communicate via face to face meetings and a google group.

• Policy, lobbying and litigation to improve policies and procedures on asylum support.
